The Amy Bindelglass Memorial Scholarship

Amy's Story

At two-years-old, blonde-haired, blue-eyed Amy Bindelglass could recite the entire alphabet and could count backwards from 10. She had a brother three years older than her who she adored, and the two received numerous compliments on how precious they looked as Peter Pan and Tinkerbell at Disneyworld on Halloween. One of her favorite pastimes was to watch Barney, and she loved the color orange.

While visiting family in January of 2000, Amy was involved in a tragic accident and lost her life. Her family made the decision to donate her organs.

The Center for Donation and Transplant established the Amy Bindelglass Memorial Scholarship with the Bindelglass Family as a way to encourage students to educate themselves and others about the importance of organ donation.



Background

The need for organ and tissue donation continues to grow. Right now, nearly 118,000 Americans are on the national waiting list for a lifesaving organ transplant. 9,500 of those waiting are New Yorkers.

Despite this incredible need in New York, our state ranks as the **lowest in the nation** when it comes to the percentage of residents who are registered on the New York State Donate Life Organ and Tissue Registry. People who register on the Donate Life registry are giving legal consent to become organ and tissue donors and helping to save lives with their generous decision.

Action IS being taken to help boost the number of people registered in New York. Thanks to the passage of the Young Adult Enrollment Law in 2016, 16 and 17-year-olds in New York can now register to be organ, eye and tissue donors, with parents providing the final consent until the young adult turns 18.

In October 2017 New York also rolled out its fully online organ and tissue registry, meaning that, for the first time ever in the state, residents could register their decision to donate life online in one minute or less. New Yorkers can now register at http://donatelife.ny.gov.

These two measures will go a long way in helping to increase the number of New Yorkers who register as a donor and give hope to those waiting for a second chance at life on the national transplant waiting list.

The Challenge

In spite of all the new measures and laws being passed to help increase the number of registered organ, eye and tissue donors, myths about donation still persist!
