



Mrs. Hammersmith-Social Studies



Your children will be learning about world history of the Eastern Hemisphere from prehistory through 1400. We will discuss geography and historical events through primary and secondary resources.

Students will need to be aware of:

Homework - Given at least once a week, sometimes more

- •Assignments will range from creative images, timeline worksheets and readings, to written informational essays and research projects (Mostly completed in class). Students will be notified early in the week of their assignments via schoology and the classroom HW board.
- •Assignments must be completed and handed in before the end of the quarter to receive any credit for their work.
- •"HW checks" are the only assignments that CANNOT be made up by the end of the quarter because we review these assignments in class.

Tests & Quizzes - Given at the end of each unit

- ·Organizational review quizzes folder checks/study quizzes
- •Students will have opportunities to do test corrections to earn back 1/2 the credit that they lost
- •Students will need to rewrite the incorrect questions fully, followed by the correct answers (any notes, textbook and other resources can be used)


- •Students will be given a review sheet for major quizzes and tests
- •Students are responsible for completing the review sheets in order to receive extra credit on their quizzes/tests

Projects and Writing

- Students will be expected to complete written assignments and research projects throughout the year
- We will focus on improving our writing using informational texts and supporting evidence
- We will also practice and improve our research skills by using library and online resources to complete projects (travel brochures, posters, presentations, flip books, timelines...etc.)

Mr. Scannell - Science



1.Lab Safety/How Science is Practiced

Students will learn safe lab practices and classroom expectations. We will learn about collecting data and how to analyze the data using graphs.

2. Earth Science/Plate Tectonics/Rocks and the Rock Cycle

Here we study the dynamics and broader aspects of Earth's geological systems. We <u>focus</u> on Earthquakes, Earth's inner structure, volcanoes and the movement of the continents why they move.

3. Sun-Earth-Moon System

For this unit students study the connections between the four seasons and the earth's orbit around the sun, how shadows are affected by not only seasons, but on the rotation of the Earth and what time of day it is..

4. Weather and Climate

We will look at the different weather systems that we experience and what cause them. we will also look at weather maps and learn how to read them.

5 Ecology

Once the warm weather arrives we will begin our unit on ecology. Students will look at how all species are interconnected and how actions on one species can have reactions with another species. We will explore the local habitat and conduct an inventory of all species in the local community/habitat.

In Science students need the following materials:

- single subject spiral-bound notebook. A box of 10 pencils to start the year. One blue and one black pen

4 red two pocket folders (one for each unit covered)

Science is taught using an inquiry based method. Students will often be using equipment to model actual events that occur naturally.

Labs – labs play a large part of our class. Students will be asked to turn in their completed labs for a grade. Often times these labs will include graphical representation of the data gathered in the labs. We will be focusing on graphing data throughout the year.

(All labs conducted in PENCIL ONLY!)

Homework - Students can expect HW 1-2 times per week. Labs often need to be competed outside class, once data has been collected. Labs will often be assigned to be finished for HW.

Quizzes & Tests –

- Unit tests will be announced well ahead of time as will most quizzes, however pop-quizzes can occur.
- <u>Science Starters a daily quiz question</u>. These take-home quizzes are collected at the start of class every Friday. Parents should check for thorough completion with their children on Thursday evenings.

3.Resource Room - The students with IEPs will have Resource Room with me. We will work on their IEP goals. It is also a time for re-teaching and practicing new skills and concepts.







4. Co-Teaching in Science and Social Studies - I will be co-teaching daily with Mr. Scannell and Mrs. Hammersmith for science and social studies.

Social Studies

5. <u>Individualized Education Plan (IEP)</u> - Students with IEP's have accommodations and modifications. An example of an accommodation is *taking a test in a small group setting*. An example of a modification is a *Modified Homework Assignment*. The homework is at the student's instructional level and pictures are used to support the vocabulary.



5. Homework Club

6. W.E.B

This stands for "Where Everyone Belongs".

- We meet after school monthly or more depending on the activities




OOTM

Odyssey of the Mind

Odyssey of the Mind teaches students to learn creative problem-solving methods while having fun in the process. By tapping into creativity, and through encouraging imaginative paths to problem-solving, students learn skills that will provide them with the ability to solve problems. Odyssey of the Mind teaches students how to think outside the box by providing open-ended problems that appeal to a wide range of interests. Students learn how to identify challenges and to think creatively to solve those problems. Students work in teams of 5-7 so they learn cooperation and respect for the ideas of others. They evaluate ideas and make decisions on their own, gaining greater self-confidence and increased self-esteem along the way. They work within a budget, so they learn to manage their money. They see that there's often more than one way to solve a problem, and that sometimes the process is more important than the end result. We meet during Triple M and after school once a week. There is a regional competition on one Saturday in February or March that we travel to.



<u>Attendance</u>

Pay Attention to Attendance: Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
- Absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other potentially serious difficulty.
- By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, regular and high attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- Missing 10 percent, or about 18 days, of the school year can drastically affect a student's academic success.
- Students can be chronically absent even if they only miss a day or two every few weeks.
- Attendance is an important life skill that will help your child graduate from college and keep a job.

<u> Attendance - What You Can Do</u>

- Talk about the importance of showing up to school everyday, make that the expectation.
- Help your child maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and medical appointments during the school day.
- Not schedule vacations during the school days/weeks
- Don't let your child stay home unless truly sick. Complaints of headaches or stomach aches may be signs of anxiety. Help your teen stay engaged
- Find out if your child feels engaged by his classes and feels safe from bullies and other threats. Make sure he/she is not missing class because of behavioral issues and school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, work with your school.
- Stay on top of academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors if necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- Encourage meaningful afterschool activities, including sports and clubs. Communicate with the school Know the school's attendance policy incentives and penalties
- Talk to teachers if you notice sudden changes in behavior. These could be tied to something going on at school. Check on your child's attendance to be sure absences are not piling up.
- Ask for help from school officials, afterschool programs, other parents or community agencies if you're having trouble getting your child to school.
