The mission of the Berlin Central School District is to maximize the diverse talents and aspirations of its students. Our students will be prepared to assume responsibility for their own success in the workforce, college, the community, and life.

All Berlin Central School District students will graduate with an excellent education and experiences that prepare them to become productive members of society. Our students will be ready to assume responsibility for their own success in the workforce, college, the community, and life.

A committee was formed to look at the needs of each of the stakeholders of the district. Administrators, Teachers (from Elementary, Middle, and High School Levels), CSEA, Informational Technology, and Educational Technology Specialists were invited to participate, and there was representation from all units. Meetings were planned bi-monthly, and attended via Zoom for convenience of all parties. Notes were taken from the meeting and all information was used in the development of the Technology Plan. Stakeholders were asked to come together for 5 meetings total to allow flexibility in attending meetings and give stakeholders an opportunity to go back to their groups and receive feedback or additional information based upon the meetings. The outcome showed a need to plan to maintain our current infrastructure, tackle Ed Law 2d compliance with the assistance of a SSO program and Questar III Boces, and ensure cyber security with our IT department.

4. How does the district's Instructional Technology Plan build upon, continue the work of, and improve upon the previous three-year plan?

This year, our committee met via Zoom which made the meetings more accessible for all members of the committee. It also extended beyond just the teaching staff and included other groups of individuals. Some additional information that was found assisted our district with other infrastructure problems within our district that didn't necessarily fall under the Technology Plan. These included classroom phones and walkie talkies for our CSEA stakeholder group. The previous 3 year plan was accelerated due to COVID-19, and it extended beyond the district's original goals. All students and teachers are now provided chromebooks, and educational technology programs are strategically centered around our LMS for ease of use. The committee's teachers feel that they have more than enough technology in their classrooms, and really only need time and training moving forward.

5. How does the district Instructional Technology Plan reflect experiences during the COVID pandemic?

Our plan mainly focuses on the preservation of the existing systems we have in place due to the COVID pandemic. We have 1:1 devices for students, teachers are trained to use hybrid models of teaching (if necessary), and protocols are in place to reassure students, teachers, and families that should we have to go remote, that effective instruction will continue. Outdoor wireless connectivity is addressed to support the community in the case that they need it, and it serves dual purposes to some of our steering committee goals to make our building a central hub for the community. Teachers will also be provided additional professional development to support our existing programs, and encouraged to use district resources and technology to positively impact instruction.

PD will continue to be implemented for GoGuardian to ensure we are teaching digital citizenship to our students.

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1. Explain how the district use of instructional technology will serve as a part of a comprehensive and sustained effort to support rigorous academic standards attainment and performance improvement for students.

Every student is 1:1 and our teachers have a touch screen chromebook with tablet and writing capabilities to support instruction. Every room is equipped with a SmartBoard and teacher workstation so teachers are able to access our educational technology for any class, and use their touch device to either interact with the board and students or work individually with students while the class is working from the board. This enables teachers to have some flexibility in teaching style with the additional devices. Our teacher assistants and support staff also have access to individual devices to assist students with navigating through assignments. Some of our teachers use online assessments, and multiple programs are available for students and teachers to use. These include, but are not limited to, assessments created directly from our LMS (Schoology), to programs like Problem-atic, i-Ready, Quizizz, Edpuzzle, Kami, Google assignments, and IXL. Other free programs are available to use, but district licenses are purchased for the listed programs and are available to all teachers in our district. There is a protocol established to request any new programs by our teachers as well. All assignments are available for students and parents to access directly from our LMS and the ability to assign individual assignments is available to teachers for differentiation purposes. Our grading policy addresses proper timelines for posting assignments, grading assignments, correcting assessments, and more, to guide teachers in our mission to incorporate technology into all of our classrooms. A group consisting of the Director of Curriculum and Instruction, Director of Technology, Informational Technology Specialists, and Educational Technology Specialists, meet monthly to discuss district needs, and other individuals are invited to participate when topics require their input.

Students all have access to a chromebook device for use in school and at home. Our district has also purchased individual hotspot devices and we have handed these out to students without internet access throughout the pandemic. Our Director of Curriculum and Instruction and IT department work with our Educational Technology Specialists to ensure the programs that are being purchased are actually implemented, and that the technology needs of our teachers and students are being met. This is largely due to the collaboration of the departments through organized monthly meetings.

3. Our LMS allows differentiated instruction in many ways but most importantly through individually assigned assignments. Teachers have the ability to create individualized assignments for students with disabilities within a digital classroom environment. At the same time they are able to see and access all of the curriculum assigned to all students in a class. There are also programs in place to allow talk to text, read aloud, dictionary, and thesaurus options for students who require them. Some students have access to more user friendly programs, purchased directly by our PPS office, if they are written into their IEP. Special education teachers are trained by the PPS department in the use of these programs.
